Should you say sorry when something is your fault?

Yes, you should say sorry when something is your fault.

Whose fault is it if a student fails an exam?

It's usually the student's **fault** if he or she fails an exam.

Is it easier to see somebody else's faults than your own?

Yes, it's easier to see somebody else's faults than your own.

Because we like to think we have no faults.

Do you return things to the shop when they're faulty?

Yes, I return things to the shop when they're faulty.

Why?

Because they should be faultless.

Can you already speak faultless English?

No, I can't speak faultless English yet.

**Why not?** Because *I still make some mistakes*.

Is this course a great opportunity to learn spoken English?

Yes, this course is a great opportunity to learn spoken English.

Is it a good idea to speak English at every opportunity?

Yes, it's a good idea to speak English at every opportunity.

Do we have a lot of job opportunities in this town?

Yes, we have a lot of job **opportunities** in this town.

or: No, we don't have a lot of job ...

Do you agree that a trip to Brazil would be a great holiday?

Yes, I agree that a trip to *Brazil* would be a great holiday.

Why? Why not?

or: No, I don't agree that a trip ... Because Brazil is an interesting country. Because I think it is too hot in Brazil.
