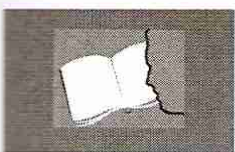
sunny	[ˈsʌni]
cloud	[klaʊd]
cloudy	[ˈklaʊdi]
umbrella	[ʌmˈbrelə]

We sometimes add -y to make an adjective,
e.g. sun – **sunny**, cloud – **cloudy**, rain – **rainy**.

What do you like doing on a sunny day?	I like <i>playing football</i> on a sunny day.
Do you carry an umbrella with you?	Yes, I <i>often</i> carry an umbrella with me. or: No, I <i>never</i> carry an umbrella ...
Do we use an umbrella on a sunny day?	No, we don't use an umbrella on a sunny day, but we use it on a rainy day.
Are there a lot of clouds today?	Yes, there are a lot of clouds today. or: No, there aren't a lot of clouds today.
Was it cloudy yesterday?	Yes, it was cloudy yesterday. or: No, it wasn't cloudy yesterday.

wind	[waɪnd]
windy	[ˈwaɪndi]

Do you like cold wind?	Yes, I like cold wind . or: No, I don't like cold wind .
Do you think tomorrow will be a windy day?	Yes, I think tomorrow will be a windy day. or: No, I don't think tomorrow will be ...
Is it easy to use an umbrella on a windy day?	No, it isn't easy to use an umbrella on a windy day.
